PQD Directive overall

The recognition of Professional Qualifications Directive (PQD) 2005/36/EC & 55/13/EC enables the free movement of **professionals** such as doctors or architects within the EU.

- a. Exception 1: such as sailors or aircraft controllers do not fall under Directive 2005/36/EC and are governed by specific legislation.
- b. Exception 2: specific laws also exist for lawyers and commercial agents.

PQD helps immensely in the EU single market



What is the EU Single Market - 1

- 4 freedoms: free movement of
 - goods (art 30 TFEU),
 - service (art 49 establishment & 56 TFEU services),
 - people(art 45 TFEU) and
 - capital (art 63 TFEU)
- Concerns 27 Member States and 5 non EU Member States, Lichtenstein, Norway, Iceland and Switzerland and now UK
- Establishment with the Single European Act on 1/1/1993 now with the Treaty of Functioning of EU (TFEU)



What is the Single Market - 2

- With the EU Economic and Monetary Union it constitutes the EU Internal Market – Marché Intérieur
- It concerns a Total EEA + EU population of 522,000,000 people and in EU only 508,191,116 that can travel, establish, work and study in the Internal Market
- In terms of GDP its about 18 trillion€

=> Aim is to increase competition, specialisation, and economies of scale



What is Regulated Profession


 A profession is said to be regulated when access and exercise is subject to the possession of a specific professional qualification.

Description of the types of regulation

- Reserves of activities refers to professions where certain activities are reserved to the holders of a specific professional qualification. This may include instances where there are shared reserved activities with other regulated professions.
- Protected title (without reserves of activities) refers to professions where only the title is protected.
- Reserves of activities and protected title refers to professions where there are both reserved activities and protected title.
- Other is used for the professions where another type of regulation than the ones outlined above applies e.g. certification of personal qualifications ex. Actuaries.



Number of regulated professions in EU - 6302






Professional Qualification Directive: what does it govern?



- Temporary mobility;
- Establishment in another EU country;
- Systems of recognition of qualifications there are three systems of recognition:
 - automatic recognition for professions listed in the directive (i.e. nurses, midwifes, doctors, dental practitioners, pharmacists, architects and veterinary surgeons);
 - general system for other regulated professions;
 - recognition on the basis of professional experience for certain professions - carpenters, upholsterers etc;
